In her final tenure as President of the First **Episcopal** District Lay Organization, Sister Cheryl Hammond Hopewell and Brother **Thomas** Davis, Director of

Lay Activities (DOLA) held the organization's Mid-Year Convention in the beautiful Bermuda Conference at Mt. Zion AME Church in Southampton Parrish. The convention convened on Friday and Saturday, February 23 and 24, with the theme "Glorifying God By Serving Beyond Yourself".



Friday morning's session of Devotion and Bible Study was led by Brother Earl Knight, First District Music Director. Using Jude 4:18-19. Brother Knight admonished us not to discouraged by those who

following ungodly ways, doing their own thing and trying to discourage us. God has bought us by His love and preserved us to serve. We have calling on our lives and must do the work that He has preserved us to do!

In parallel, Robin Batson, First District Lay Third Vice President, conducted a First Timers' Session, where she provided training on the AME Church Lay Organization.



After an orientation of the theme by DOLA Thomas Davis, opening remarks by President Hopewell, and a warm welcome by Bermuda Conference Lay Organization President W. Anthoni Lightbourne, the attendees were enriched by two theme-focused workshops:



1) Rev. Dr. Jahkimmo Smith, Pastor of Mount Zion AMEC, Bermuda: "Have You Washed Any Feet Lately?", taken from John 13:1-13 NLT. Reverend Smith taught us

that "Christlike service compels us to strip away the things that keep us from serving.

2) "Glorifying God by Serving Beyond Yourselves -Focusing on Bishop Richard Allen's Life", presented by Reverend Mark K. Tyler who was virtual from South Africa. He said that we have normally focused on Richard Allen as a young man and an adult, but there

is not much focus on his elderly years. At age 70, Richard Allen felt the need to get involved. Due to violence against Black people in Cincinnati in 1829, restrictive "Black laws", and attacks against Black success, he opened the doors of Mother

Convention Movement" to Resist, Emphasize selfdetermination, and Fight Back against Jim Crow, KKK, etc. Reverend Tyler reminded us that "there is no age that God cannot get something out of us." We need to follow Richard Allen's model.

New England Conference Lav President Linda Gant discussed distribution of food. clothing, and other necessities throughout the Connecticut, Massachusetts, and Rhode Island communities.

New Jersey Conference President Elizabeth Clark spoke about distribution of clothing, socks, school supplies, a Love Feast, Women's Shelter diaper distribution, helping families with rent problems,

and supporting Evangelists' outreach to children during Christmas, the Unsung Heroes breakfasts, and 5th Sunday Fellowships.

New York Conference Lay President Bonita O'Neal spoke about outreach areas: Soup kitchen, food pantry, block association co-sponsorship for food purchase and distribution, voter registration, Operation



Asylum Seekers for clothing, food, shelter and other needs, breast cancer seminar, and 2 Fish & 5 Loaves distribution of socks, hats, gloves, and school supplies.



Philadelphia Conference Lay President Andree' Turner spoke about feeding the community, Child Sexual Abuse Preventative workshops, Health workshops, Civil Rights workshops, and supporting other ministries

including Unsung Heroes breakfasts, Frank C. Cummings Scholarship, and YPD coalition.

Reports from the First District delegates to the 38th CLO Biennial followed the Conference Presidents' sharing session: Bermuda – Mrs. Donna Lee Chandler Smith, 1st VP; Western New York – Sister Marjorie Wright; Delaware – President Sharon Drew; New England – Sister Annie Haynes; New Jersey – President Elizabeth Clark; New York – Sister Mary Whitis and President Bonita O'Neal; Philadelphia – Brother Shawn Lee.

The Evening Worship was led by Bermuda Lay Conference President Brother W. Anthoni Lightbourne with the Conference Presidents serving as worship participants.

Reverend Dr. Emily Gail A. Dill, Bermuda Conference Itinerant Elder, introduced the preacher, the Reverend Dr. Jahkimmo F. Smith. Reverend Smith's sermon was taken from Luke 10:36-37 (Jesus' parable of the Good Samaritan), with the subject, "Go and Do the Same". In Jesus' words, He challenges us to put ourselves in someone else's shoes. We must go do the same as Jesus did. Reverend Smith challenged us, asking the question, "Are you / we ready to go and do the same"?

The service concluded with "Prayer for Services to Others", "Prayer of Commitment and Rededication" by Bermuda Presiding Elder Howard H. Dill, Reflections by President Cheryl Hammond Hopewell, and the Lay Benediction sang by all.

Saturday's session began with Brother Earl Knight again leading us in song, "This is My Story, This is My Song, devotion, and Bible Study, with prayer by Brother Kevin D. Lamb, Philadelphia Conference.

Brother Knight's lesson was "Let's Do This Together", taken from Psalm 34:1-4. Sometimes it is hard to get people together on one accord to get things done. God has not called us to do it alone. Brother Knight used our hybrid meeting as an example. It was hosted by Bermuda Conference, but it required others to work together using technology so that others could join. We did it together! We all have different gifts, talents, and expertise. We must put these together, let go of our insecurities, work together, and glorify God!



Reverend Dr. Leonard Santucci, Pastor of Vernon Temple AMEC, Bermuda Conference, presented our final workshop, "A Call to Action". He highlighted three points:

- 1. Call to liberty We've been set free.
- 2. Call to love one another Empathy!
- 3. Call to serve one another Through our service, we Empower.

After this thought-provoking and well-received workshop, President Hopewell led the Business Session with Roll Call, brief greetings by the officers, Conference President remarks, and comments from the advisors: Sister Mary Mootoo and Sister Edna Sharp.

President Hopewell announced the July Annual Meeting dates of July 26-27, 2024 with the Executive Board meeting on July 25. The Delaware Conference Lay Organization will be hosting in Wilmington, Delaware.

The 2025 Mid-Year Convention will be February 21 - 22, with the Executive Board meeting on February 20. The Philadelphia Conference Lay Organization will be hosting.

President Hopewell also announced the candidates for First District Lay Officers.

A 90-minute Zoom virtual tour of the Mother Bethel and Richard Allen Museum followed the business session. Afterwards, President Hopewell gave closing remarks followed by the Lay Benediction and circle. Another successful meeting by our illustrious leader!

Stalwart Women Shall Live Forever in our Hearts

We mourn the death of Dr. Juanita J. High born on September 25, 1930, in Atlantic City, New Jersey peacefully transitioned on January 24, 2024, at Gulf Coast Medical Center in Fort Myers, Florida where she was a winter resident.

Sister Juanita served as president of the Atlantic City District of the conference Lay Organization under the leadership of the late Siter Brenda Lazier former President of the New Jersey Conference. Up until her death, she was President Elizabeth Clark's adviser and she served on The Frank C. Cummings NJ conference and First Episcopal District level. Scholarship Committee.

In addition to working hard in her local church, and the New Jersey Conference Lay Organization she was a lifelong member of Saint James AME Church in Atlantic City as a Steward. As well as holding numerous offices in her local church she was the President of the Senior Choir; a member of the Senior Steward Board; chair of the Worship Commission; vice chair of the Finance Committee; and president of Bright's Villa Board of Saint James AME Church, which provides housing for more than 100 families in the Atlantic City area.

In celebration of a life so beautifully lived a sweet, kind, and soft-spoken person entered this world on August 30, 1940, in Havelock, North Carolina. On February 6, 2024, in the twinkling of an eye, she peacefully entered eternal rest at the Riverview Medical Center in Red Bank, New Jersey was Elizabeth "Liz" Anderson. Sister Liz served as New Jersey Conference Lay Organization as Director of Lay Actives under the leadership of the late Sister Brenda Lazier the former President of the New

Jersey Conference, as well as being the Lay President of the New Brunswick District of the New Jersey Conference.

In 1968 Liz joined Trinity African Methodist Episcopal Church in Long Branch, New Jersey. Before joining she had already had a relationship with God by giving her life to Christ at an early age in Havelock, North Carolina. While attending Trinity she served in leadership roles as Local President of the WMS and WMS Asbury Area Chairperson of the District of the Conference.

After Sister Anderson retired from Prudential, she loved doing the work for the Lord by working full-time as the church administrative assistant under many pastors' administrations until the present pastor Reverend Dr. Lesley Devereaux.

Being a dedicated servant, Liz was always willing to offer help to the people in the church and community, especially working as the overseer for the weekly food distribution for the community. While serving her church and community, people relied on Liz for rides to the doctors or running errands to the grocery store. The life work and perseverance of Opal Lee in getting Juneteenth recognized as a national holiday was described as an example. God will fill the gaps, and prayer and trust in Him will empower us for the journey if we go together, follow instructions, and go forth with courage, teaching repentance, and offering healing through anointing with oil which imparts the power of Jesus. Do not get weary.

Sister Debrest cited Mark 6:7-13. He is coming back to meet us where we are and equip and empower us for the journey. Through prayer and a thirst and hope for an ever improving and better Church, we will succeed. 
